## ABOUT THE MERITO FOUNDATION

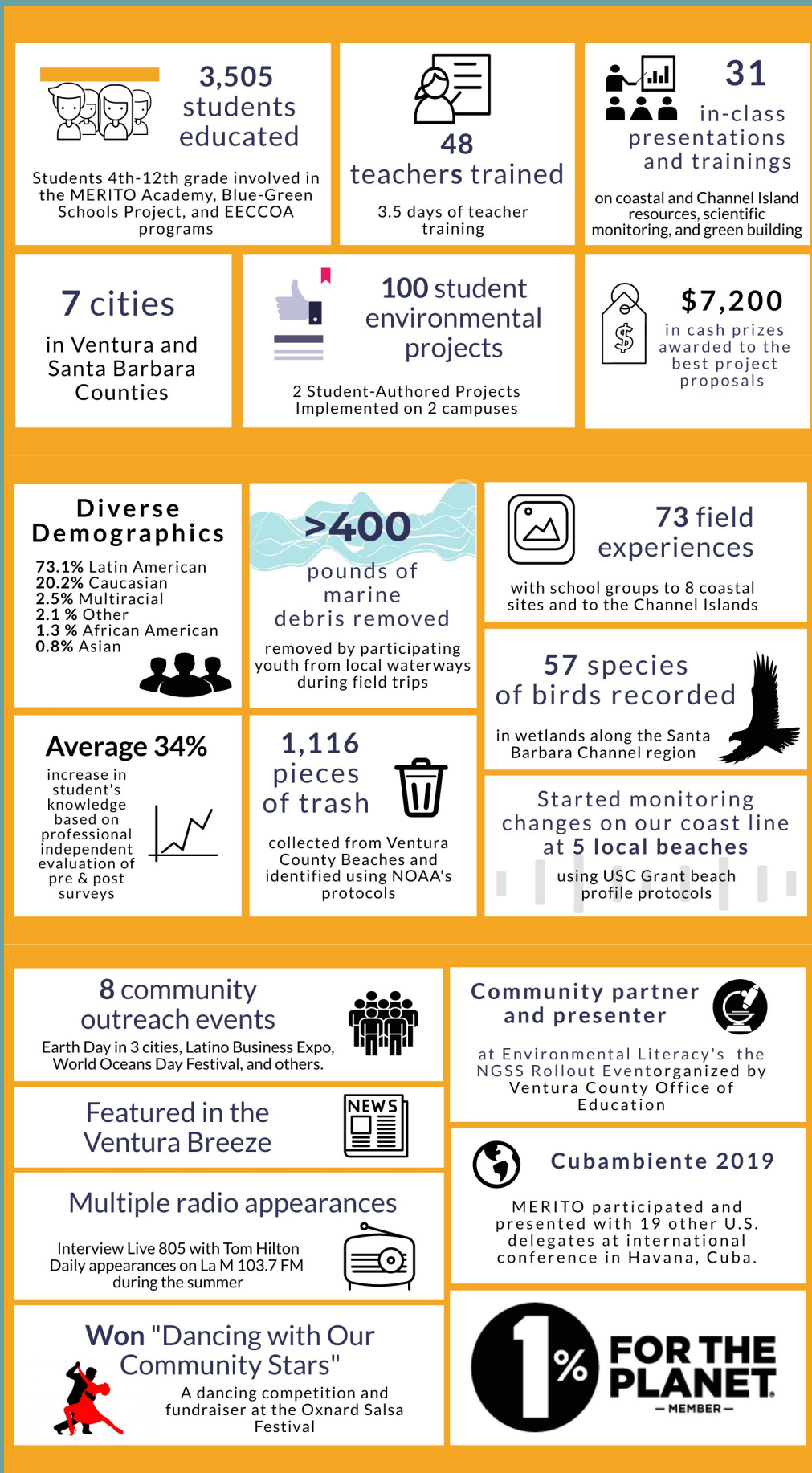

## 2019 ACCOMPLISHMENTS SUMMARY

Thanks to support of our financial donors, volunteers and partners, during the 2019-2020 school year, the MERITO Foundation provided in-depth education, conducted field-based citizen scientific data collection and presented informative bilingual outreach to the teachers, students and communities and organizations we serve. We support teachers with NGSS-aligned professional development and meaningful classroom and field experiences. Our programs support the development of student-authored projects, provide incentives through cash prizes at our annual EECCOA Awards Challenge and help build the capacity of our future workforce through partnerships with multiple local, regional, state and federal partners. We strive to build stewardship for the coastal and marine resources of the Santa Barbara Channel region among traditionally underrepresented communities.

# PROGRAMS

## ENERGY EFFICIENCY TO MITIGATE CLIMATE CHANGE & OCEAN ACIDIFICATION (EECCOA) PROGRAM FOR 8TH-12TH GRADE LEVELS

EECCOA is a project-based science education program that provides supplemental, NGSS aligned energy, climate, and ocean literacy to 8th - 12th grade teachers and their students. It empowers students to address climate change and ocean acidification by providing them the tools to research, design, promote, and implement projects to help mitigate climate change by increasing energy efficiency, water conservation, and reducing waste on their school campuses. Alternatively, students can develop ocean acidification awareness campaigns to inform their communities about this issue and its relation to climate change.

The EECCOA program's most important accomplishments and milestones in 2019:

- 2,357 students mainly from STEM underrepresented minorities (>75%) were immersed in ocean, climate, and energy science, and stewardship activities on their school campus, local watersheds, and coastal environments.
- 8 introductory presentations and school energy, waste and water audits during the spring of 2019.
- 11 meaningful field experiences with 700 students to collect environmental data and restore habitats along the Santa Barbara Channel Region.
- 16 teacher enrolled in the EECCOA Program received 3 Professional Development training days.
- Two environmental projects authored by students are being implemented at their respective school campuses (Jonata MS and Anacapa MS).
- EECCOA students presented to the Ventura County Board of Supervisor about their project ideas, which proposed to decrease the environmental footprint of their school campus (pictured below).



# PROGRAMS

## MERITO ACADEMY & BLUE GREEN SCHOOLS PROJECT FOR 4TH - 7TH GRADE LEVELS

The MERITO Academy seeks to connect the school campus and local community with our coastal and marine habitats. Having reached over 16,000 students since 2004, the MERITO Academy has been MERITO's signature program. During the 2019-2020 school year, the Academy launched the Blue-Green School Project (BGSP). This project adds an advocacy element that promotes beneficial behaviors and empowers students to actively mitigate our region's drought, flood, and wildfire risks through projects that conserve natural resources and prevent pollution on their school campuses.

Through the MERITO Academy's program and Blue-Green Schools Project, the MERITO Foundation was able to:

- Involve 1,153 students from Title 1 schools in earth and ocean science stewardship activities.
- Introduce 4-7th grade students to the coastal and marine resources of the Santa Barbara Channel Region and the Channel Islands through 20 introductory bilingual in-class presentations.
- Train school groups on the implementation of NOAA's Office of National Marine Sanctuaries Long term Monitoring and Experimental Training of Students (LiMPETS) protocols for sandy and rocky intertidal habitats.
- Instruct 34 school groups during 21 field experiences to local wetlands, beaches, estuaries, and the Channel Islands.
- Provide 2 full days of Professional Development & access to NGSS-aligned and Common Core curricula to 30 teachers enrolled in the MERITO Academy and BGSP from 8 schools.



# EECCOA CHALLENGE & AWARDS EVENT

The EECCOA Challenge is the culmination of the EECCOA program that involves a student competition supported by the community. Students develop projects to mitigate climate change, ocean acidification, reduce their school's utilities costs, and reduce the carbon footprint of their schools. Students are taught skills that help them grow their environmental entrepreneurship abilities. EECCOA projects are authored by teams of 3 to 5 students in one of four tiers: Energy Efficiency, Water Conservation, Waste Reduction, or Ocean Acidification Outreach.

- **101 student teams** developed projects for the EECCOA Challenge 2019
- **Over 200 students, teachers, parents, school administrators, volunteers, and partners** attended the EECCOA Challenge on May 31, 2019
- A team of **15 STEM and business professionals volunteers over 120 hours** to review and select the best projects authored by students.
- **15 teams of students received a total \$6,900**, in cash prizes & over \$1000 in in-kind awards.
- **Ventura County Board of Supervisors, Steve Bennett opened the award event** with gracious and inspiring words
- **Community businesses** and agencies supported the event through sponsorships.

# PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION

**Anacapa Middle School students spearhead a project to lower their school's energy use.** A project proposed by a team of students in Ms. Mendez's class has been implemented as a part of Ventura Unified School District's ongoing commitment to sustainability. During the 2018-19 school year, students in Ms. Mendez's class who participated in the EECCOA Challenge 2019, calculated potential electricity savings by installing sensors for the classrooms that automatically shut off the lights when not in use. Students returned to class this fall to find that over the summer, maintenance staff had installed the devices identified in their project proposal.

**Concerned students implement a plastic bottle recycling program on campus.** EECCOA Challenge 2019 1st Prize winners "Bottles for Profit," from Jonata Middle School in Buellton are excited to be implementing their project this year. Students identified a business opportunity that reduces the number of plastic bottles ending up in the trash by recovering the CRV value at a local redemption center. Students from the previous year had already raised enough funds to implement the project last June before moving on to high school. In 2019-2020, a new group of students are implementing the project and expanding it to include collection throughout the entire campus.

# CITIZEN SCIENCE

We facilitate the youth's participation in scientific research by integrating citizen science protocols in our field studies with students. We collaborate with scientists, educational institutions and governmental agencies. Volunteers, educators and students participating in our programs are trained on how to collect scientifically sound data, which is recorded in databases used by scientists worldwide. In 2019, 73 school groups participated in field experiences in the Santa Barbara Channel Region and collected data on water quality, wetland bird species, marine debris, microplastics, beach topography, and NOAA LiMPETS Program.

Some of our outcomes:

- 73 school groups participated during our field studies in the Santa Barbara Channel Region and collected scientific data that contributes to ongoing scientific research projects including water quality, aquatic bird species abundance and distribution, marine debris, microplastics, monitored sandy beach and rocky intertidal habitats and beach topography.
- Our students removed and sorted > 400 pounds of marine debris and identified the source of 1,116 pieces of trash from Ormond Beach and Surfer's Knoll in Ventura County
- 1. 57 species of birds were recorded in wetlands along the Santa Barbara Channel Region with the highest diversity at Snoopy Pond by the Water Reclamation Facility (likely the most important breeding ground for Green and Night Crown Herons in the region)
- Initiated monitoring of coast line changes by following USC Sea Grants beach profile protocols at Gaviota, Surfer's Knoll, Buenaventura, County Line, and Leo Carrillo State Beaches
- With assistance from Algalita and initiated a microplastics monitoring program and database for sandy beaches along the Santa Barbara Channel region



## BILINGUAL OUTREACH

We build stewardship for coastal and marine resources of the Santa Barbara Channel region to the general public, and also to traditionally not included audiences. Our information includes issues concerning our watersheds, our coast and the Channel Islands. In 2019, we provided bilingual (English and Spanish) information on environmentally sound practices, ocean protection and natural resource conservation through public outreach events, conferences, STEM fairs for youth, social media campaigns, local radio, traditional printed publications and less traditional events including Oxnard's Salsa Festival during the 'Dancing with the Community Stars'. Our outreach reaches communities in typically underserved media markets. The MERITO Foundation participated in 8 community events including Earth Day Oxnard, Santa Barbara, Eco-Fest Ventura, Climate Marches, and many more outreach events directly engaging with community members in their own neighborhoods.

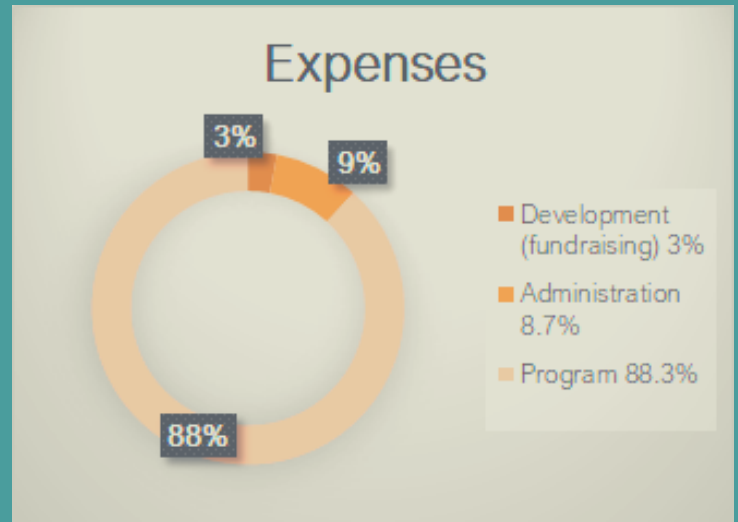
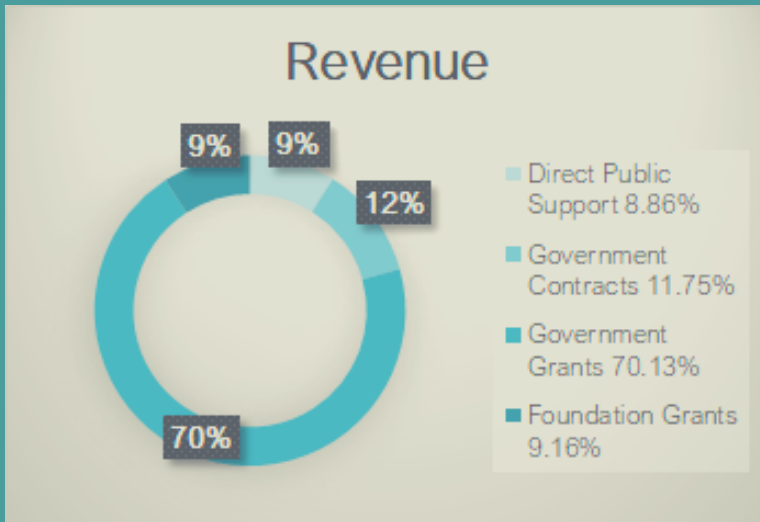
The youth that participates in our programs also educate the public. A good example are the students of Montalvo Elementary, whose marine art with environmental messages was exhibited for over a month in one of Ventura's newest and most exposed buildings off Victoria Ave.



A new partnership was established with the California State Parks in the 2018-2019 school year, which resulted in 5 restoration events to the Kalorama Wetland adjacent to the Ventura Pier. Students had the opportunity to perform ecological restoration and monitoring activities.
